Tech Talk 2.0 By Paul Troxell

Winter Prep

As we are enjoying a bit of a cool spell these past couple of weeks and getting in a few more shows, camping trips, and family get togethers I thought that I would use a bit of space to remind everyone to use some of this time to get our cars (and RV's) ready for the coming winter months. Fortunately, we don't have to go through the details that those who live in the colder climates do with their machines that are not driven at all in the winter. Still, with the time change nearing and if El Nino blesses us with plenty of cool weather and rain there are automotive checks that need to be done.

Many of us just put our wheels away for the winter. If you fit into this category, then more than likely you have a spring maintenance program that you use to bring your baby out of hibernation. Even so, there is a procedure for tucking them in for the winter. Start by filling the tank with fresh gasoline (for storage longer that 4-6 months also use a fuel conditioner and run the engine long enough for it to fill the lines, carburetor and/or fuel injection system). Change the oil and filter so as not to allow all of the contaminants that have built up to produce acids and sludge. Along with all of the detail work you did inside and out, before you slip the car cover on, (Really? You don't drive it in the rain AND you don't have a car cover!? I ain't buyin' that!!), anyway, it is a good idea to jack the car up and put it on jack stands so that the tires don't flat spot from sitting in the cold. Remember what you paid for those? Yah, they ain't cheap and they ain't gonna get any cheaper, I don't care who is elected. So put it on jack stands if you aren't going to drive it. And, thank me next year with the money you don't spend on new tires! By now, you know me, I would also change the transmission fluid and rear axle fluid because lubricants are cheap and new or rebuilt anything is expensive. I understand that your baby might be a trailered show queen and I respect that, but lubricants age and oxidize producing acids. Especially when they are not brought up to operating temperature regularly. For these special cars I feel even more strongly that a regular maintenance schedule should be at least annually. Put them away, dream good dreams, enjoy the Holidays, and then start getting antsy for spring.

For us who drive our cars all year long the things that I would focus on are more safety related. Now is a good time to start paying attention to windshield wipers that are on sale. Nowadays there are many good choices and the technology is light years from what was produced back 50-60 years ago. In fact, some brands will last 2 seasons on a car that is parked outdoors all of the time, IF the wipers and windshield are kept clean, due to the superior formulation of the wiper blade material. All of the more expensive brands go on sale at some point and can be had at a very reasonable price. If you like Rain-X or any of the windshield treatments get some and put it on a couple of times before the rain starts in order for them to perform the best. Oh yea, put the wiper blades up so that they are not on the windshield and turn them on to ensure that they work. Do they work on high speed, too? Sucks to find out in a rain storm that those brand-new exotic material blades won't do a thing since the wiper motor was inoperative.

Check all of your exterior lighting. Check that it not only works, but consider how old the lights themselves are. A few dollars and minutes spent here now may keep you from having a conversation with that special someone with a badge on the side of the road.

Headlights. Did you notice that they did not seem quite as bright the last time that you were out late? Headlights (in fact all lights) degrade over time and produce less light. So, it may not be Macular Degeneration like the guy on the TV commercial told you! If your headlights are four or more years old (maybe even less if you drive a lot at night), you may find that a new set of bulbs will correct the problem. Headlight tech has also moved forward a lot over the years and even new sealed beams are a night and day difference from the originals (see what I did there?). And if your car came with HID or LED units, they will also degrade over time, but fortunately over a much longer time, so when you notice that they just aren't as good as they used to be, change them out. These units will be far more expensive than the old tungsten-halogen sealed beam units but you won't be able to tell the insurance company what you ran over if you couldn't see it. No matter what type of headlight you have make sure that they work and are in good condition.

Tires. Check for proper inflation. This is something that should be being done at the very minimum of monthly. But, keep in mind that as the season get cooler that will also affect the pressure in the tires. More often is better. By now, I am sure that everyone knows how to use a penny to check tread depth. If you stick a penny into the grove in the tire and the tread does not reach to the top of Mr. Lincoln's head, anywhere on the tread, then you should be going to your favorite tire shop to award them with many Benjamins for a new set. Hydroplaning not only can cause loss of directional control of the car, but will also greatly increase stopping distances. Worn tires will underperform in all conditions and are more susceptible to damage from road hazards and blow outs. If you are not able to inspect your tires, take them to a tire shop that you trust and ask them to do it and set the pressures. Ask for the tread depth measurements so that you can make the decision yourself. In California 1/32" in is the legal minimum depth. Personally, I would not let them get that worn. Take a look at a ruler or tape measure and see for yourself what 1/32" is. Now look at that penny. Mr. Lincoln's head is 2/32" from the edge of the coin. How fast do you want to go with tires that worn?

Of course, I am sure that we all have spent most of our leisure time out in the shop checking every fluid level, measuring every brake pad or lining, and stressing over whether we should change the power steering fluid because it got 25 hours on it this season. But, giving some thought to the items that I have mentioned above, and some that I have not, will help to make your winter driving or storage experience a better one. Above all, safety is the first thought that we should all have. Tires, brakes, lights, and the general condition of the vehicle can all make your winter safer or one that you would rather forget. Even something like that small tear in the convertible top that you had been ignoring all summer will turn your winter into a dismal experience (what is that smell and why can't I get the windshield defrosted?).

So, take a few minutes and think about what you need to do to have a safe and reliable driving experience as we slide into the fall and winter months. These are my two favorite seasons and I probably do more of my fun driving during them. But I still don't like being on the side of the road cold and wet trying to fix something that I could have taken care of during these 70–80-degree days like we are having now.

CHMC ELECTION INFORMATION

It's that time of year again!

Election time is near and we need to find out who would like to run for office or board position. The board is made up of four elected officers (President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer), the outgoing President, and not less than three, nor more than six members in good standing (current dues paid). Any member in good standing who would like to participate in the management of the club is encouraged to add their name to the ballot. If you are interested in running for office and cannot attend the October meeting, please call President Sue Calvert (see page 2) so that your name can be added to the ballot. Remember, no experience is needed, just willingness to help the club and lots of Mustang spirit! Nominations will be presented at the October General Meeting and nominations will also be taken from the floor at that time. If you want to be nominated for a position and cannot attend the October meeting, please notify the president.

The ballot will be mailed to you in early November and you can either mail it to the P.O. Box or bring it to the November General Meeting.

The following list explains the duties of each office:

- ★ President: Presides over club meetingsboard & general (calls meetings to order; announces sequence of business to be discussed; recognizes members entitled to the floor, calls for motions on any questions when necessary, adjourns the meetings, and delegates duties as needed, including the handling of club correspondence), and signs all contracts or other instruments or writing approved by the Board of Directors.
- ★ Vice-President: Presides over club meetings -board and general- in the absence of the President; (see President), maintains the club calendar, and is the contact member for members interested in chairing club activities.

- ★ Secretary: Keeps a record (minutes) of club meetings-board and general; maintains a club roster (unless another officer or board member is assigned to do so); keeps record books of club by-laws and minutes; as well as any amendments thereto, and any other significant reports; prepares and mails election ballots; may prepare an agenda for each meeting if so requested by the president; prepares/responds to club correspondence as directed; and performs other duties as prescribed by the Board of Directors.
- ★ Treasurer: Handles club funds (receipts and deposits); balances the club checking account records with the bank account statement monthly; makes a financial report to the membership each month regarding income and expenditures, collects membership dues and other income; handles the sale of club t-shirts; attempts to collect on dishonored checks received by the club; and makes disbursements as authorized by the board.
- ★ Our club provides an MCA membership to all officers during their term
- ★ Any combination of officers may be required to sign checks for disbursements made from the club account.
- ★ At least two officers hold a key to the club mail box and are responsible for collecting mail.

Editor's note: Something to think about! Without officers, we don't have a club. Several of our officers and board members have served many terms, and a couple have indicated that this is their last year. Please consider stepping up to keep this club fun and active!
