Squadron "68" Visits Wings Over Solano Airshow

The weekend of March 16 and 17 was a very busy one in Solano County, particularly up in the warm, bright (Brittany) blue skies above Travis Air Force Base, where the much-anticipated Wings Over Solano airshow and open house was taking place.

In late February, when word of the upcoming airshow was starting to show up in social media, I had heard that there would be a vintage P-51 Mustang on static display, as part of the Tuskegee Airmen exhibit. As our favorite car shares the same name (although Ford's car was named for the wild, free spirit of the open range Mustang horse, not the famous World War II fighter plane), I thought it would be a great enhancement to the airshow display field to have a handful of shiny Mustang ponies next to the shiny P-51 Mustang!

Having attended the Wings-N-Wheels car show last May out at the Aviation Museum, I had met Kevin Sullivan, the museum director, who expressed interest in doing future museum events with car clubs like trunk-an-treats (or is it treats in trunks?), so he was my first point of contact. We had a quick conversation about our club's support of Veterans and annual participation in Fairfield's Veterans Day Parade, and he forwarded my email to the personnel responsible for static displays. Within a couple days the email interrogations began... "What's our purpose to be there? What are we selling? What are we handing out?" "Displays are supposed to be aviation only" ... I was ready for these questions, but just in case I called Dan McCabe to refresh my memory for some talking points on our past affiliation with the Wounded Warriors Family Support charity (no other Mustang Club in the nation did more to support that charity than we did), just in case I had to play that card.

I think the truth won them over, and that was the fact that we have club members who retired from careers at Travis as mechanics, loadmasters, etc. who would be willing to talk with people about their positive experiences in the Air Force. Personally, I told them of my dad's career as an Air Force pilot, and how Travis was my dad's last base assignment from 1968 to 1972 as he helped usher in the new C-5A Super Galaxy as Chief Pilot of the first West Coast C-5

Squadron (75th MAS), and how I wanted to display some of his model planes and AF memorabilia on the trunk of my car. I had requested a space big enough to display 4-6 cars, but as they "didn't want this to take on the feel of a car show", they ultimately gave me the green light to bring three cars to display next to the Tuskegee P-51, "Bunny".

Terry Burke was the first person I thought of when I initially had the idea to try and gain approval for a club car display at the airshow. Terry, a retired C-5 mechanic, who always wears his dress blues at Veterans Day Parades! And his pedal car painted to match his '68 Coupe would be a hit with kids. And Ron Normandin, who retired from Travis as a C-141 mechanic, with his '68 California Special, also came immediately to mind. Needing a trunk surface to display my dad's memorabilia meant I would be bringing the '68 Shelby convertible. So with these three 1968's...the Golden Hills Mustang "Squadron 68" was formed!

It was a great THREE days. The public show was Saturday and Sunday, but they asked us to be there Friday also (which made load-in and set-up much easier), as it was Family Day for Travis personnel. Friday was very windy and cloudy-cold, but Saturday and Sunday were both so warm I went "topless" both days! We were given a great location right on the flight line, so our display area was very busy. Several hundred pictures were taken of each of our cars both days. Many conversations were had about our club and our Air Force connections; I think we all ran out of GHMC business cards by Sunday afternoon.

All in all, I think we made a positive impression in our community. Thank you again Ron and Terry for giving up three full days to join me at this display. A special thanks to Terry for some great photography, and wearing his dress blues all three days, especially during the weekend warm weather! I'm already looking forward to the next Wings Over Solano in 2026.




Tech Talk 2.0

This month I thought that we would take a look at some different type of tech that I/we normally do. As much as we all enjoy talking about such things as compression ratios, manual vs. auto trans, and posi-traction differentials, I have recently delved into an area that is really quite a rabbit hole. So, let's jump into telemetrics!

What the heck is telemetrics you say? Well, I am sure that you all have heard of the "Black Box" that the FAA furiously looks for when an aircraft crashes, right? Well, aside from the fact that the "Black Box" is actually bright orange, there may also be something similar on your Mustang. Ford began using Event Data Recorders (EDR) with the 2001 model year Mustang. Essentially these modules are capable of recording the status of several different systems just prior to and during a crash event. Things like throttle position, brake application and force, antilock operation, stability control (if equipped) operation, g-force and direction just to name some that may be recorded. This is commonly embedded in the Engine Control Unit and cannot be disconnected or over ridden by the operator or owner. This is what the insurance company and/or law enforcement may plug into and download to help determine fault. These units were not connected to clouds, Wi-Fi, or cell systems and the information on them was only accessible by connecting to the OBD port to download.

But you didn't think that it would stop there, did you? Since the introduction of EDR's for automobiles, technology has taken us to new heights. As we all know, "Data is King". And nowadays just about everything that we do and say is collected and stored somewhere. Even if it is of no use today, it may become useable and valuable information at a later date. It is especially the valuable part that makes it "King". That data is what can be sold to generate profit. To give you some examples, whenever we download an app to our phones there is that window that we come to called the "Agreement". And what do nearly all of us do? Well, we usually don't read it, we just click agree because we are so anxious to begin partaking in the wonderful convenience that the app provides. Right? Well, if we did take the time to read through them carefully, we would find that almost always these apps collect data. Data of all kinds. Some want access to your photo library, your address book, locations services, other apps that you may have, your credit card, and on and on. But, the convenience! There is a point that the data collection gets to that the information collected can tell someone else who has access to it more that you know about yourself. Being human we cannot possibly remember every single thing that we have done, possess, or say. But the computer never forgets the data.

So on to more telemetrics in our Mustangs. Remember when annually your insurance company would mail you a

form to return asking for the mileage on your insured car(s)? Remember when you might have received an invitation to become a member of the Nielson Family to rate television programming? Sorry, did not mean to make anyone consider their age. Well, we don't have to do that anymore. If you have Comcast service for your TV, or a 2018 or newer model Mustang all of that is taken care of for you. Oh! The convenience! It is not a conspiracy theory that newer televisions may have the capability to watch and listen to you. That certain apps (Facebook) have the ability to listen to your conversation and know your location, even when you are not using the app. That your Roomba is GPS mapping your house and may even be taking photos of you and your house without your knowledge. And your security camera system may be providing video to various other agencies including the police. For more fun and games on this and more see "Rob Braxman Tech" on YouTube. Oh My! The convenience of all of this! Now I have so much more time to...whatever.

Back to the Mustang. Starting with the 2018 model year Mustangs (and many, many other models, some even sooner) were delivered with a TCU (Telemetric Control Unit). These communicate with Ford Pass and other offerings from Ford. If you signed up for them and have not turned off the Wi-Fi in your car it is sending a constant stream of information about the vehicle and the way that it is being operated. That is how the Service Tech knows that you have been revving the engine past 8000 RPM and doing over 145 MPH when you call him to make an appointment for the blown clutch and severe oil consumption. That is also how the insurance company knows how many miles you have on the car. They may send you a card asking you to report your mileage, but most likely they already know if your Mustang (or any other Ford) is a 2018 or newer model.

The TCU system collects and sends plenty of other information. I am sure that some of it is used by Ford to develop more and better products for their customers. I am not really sure why it is important for them to know where I go, how long I stay, how fast I drive or brake, how hard I corner, and what I say in conversation with my passenger (if in fact it can record this); but I personally do not think that it is their business, or the insurance companies' business, or Big Brother's for that matter. I own the car, not the bank, and I can do with it as I please; barring illegal activities like robbing banks, transporting illegal substances, drag racing (except on the track), or road racing (again, except on the track).

Remember, I mentioned generating profit? Now, you would not think that Ford collects all of this data and just lets it sit, would you? NO! Ford says "Imma gonna

sell me some data, and makka somma money outta dat!". And that data is more than likely available to anyone who wants to pay for it, just like Facebook, Google, and thousands of other operations do.

So, one might ask, "Can I disconnect the TCU?". The answer to this "yes" and "no". I would suggest that you go back to the original contract from when you bought the car and start there. Read very carefully. Did you sign a user agreement that forbids disconnection? Then, go back and read the user agreement that you clicked "Agree" to the first time that you accessed the program in the car, App on your phone, or computer. Is there a clause that forbids you to disconnect the TCU or service? You may find that you will need to contact your attorney to decipher the legalese the User Agreement(s) that you hurriedly signed or clicked because you have a full tank of gas, and several more to burn, before you can really put the hammer down on your new Pony. Or, you might just decide to disconnect the TCU and fuhgeddaboutit.

It really boils down to how you feel about the data collected and the convenience that you feel you get from the system. There are those who say "I am not doing anything wrong so I don't care what they know" and the other end of the spectrum there are those who flatly state "It is my car, I paid for it, and I will do with it as I please". Then there are all of those in between. For some, the ignorance of what TCU does is part of their bliss, and cannot be denied. For others, they simply do not care about all of the data that is collected about their lives and have a different definition of what privacy is, and they too cannot be denied. Myself? I am

glad that I own a 2017 Mustang GT and other than the EDR, I am unaware that it has any other spy equipment on it, at least for now. And if I were to find out that it does have spies on board? I would still drive the heck out of it and love every minute of it. And, I would buy a newer model Mustang without hesitation; it would also have to be modified like every other car or truck that I have ever owned.

This subject is one that is a very technical and deep subject that I cannot cover all of in this space. I have already mentioned Rob Braxman Tech on YouTube. For a longer and deeper discussion on this subject you can go to <https://www.mustang6g.com/> and in the search bar type in 4G Modem Removal or Telematics and you will find plenty of discussion on the subject. Even a search on your favorite data gathering browser will turn up info on TCU's, telematics, and so on.

I am not making a judgment on the spy services incorporated in our Mustangs. I just thought that I would write this to make you all more aware of just a few of their capabilities and use. And to make you even happier about ownership of an older Mustang that is blind, deaf, and dumb data collection wise. 




