



She also shared a story about her own daughter, who as a child and teenager, was very strong-willed. She felt deep inside that the horse would help her daughter through this challenging stage in her life. And it very much did! When her daughter was older, she gave her mom a book that ignited the spirit and spark that inspired Denise to help others overcome issues by using the healing power of horses. The name of that book is: The Power of Horses to Heal/Riding Home, by Tim Hayes.

Mary Aguilera, Ph.D., a Board Member shared her story on how a horse helped her rekindle a relationship with an estranged family member. She described the movements of an angle. Denise explained to her that the horse was not deserting her, but leaving itself open to further interaction. Mary continued to share how her relationship with her relative began slowly, with texting. Not too long after they started "talking", her relative asked her to be with them because they were going to have a serious surgery. She felt compelled to honor their request and be there for them. It was a very horse led her to reconnect with a family member.

During the evening there was a silent auction with some very nice donated items; Kathy Loya had the highest bid, and won the "Dog Goodie/Treats Bucket". Jim Wilson, Denise's

The Premium Question

No, not insurance premium. Not even "Should I get the Premium option?" on the new Mustang that I am ordering. This time, as you would expect, it's the question of "Should I put premium gasoline in my tank?". The answer to this will be different depending on who you ask. There is a group that will say that all gasoline, except for the octane rating, is the same. It does not matter where you buy it, it is the same gasoline. It is the same stuff; it is just coming out of a pump with a different name on it.

Well, actually, they would be at least partially right. The gasoline that we get DOES come out of the same pipe or tank and is the same gasoline that all gas stations get delivered by truck. In fact, untreated gasoline is 83 octane. Oh, you say that you have never seen that? Well, it is in fact just that. The bulk of the gasoline made in the United States is 83 octane gasoline. It does not become 87, 89, or 91 octane until it is loaded into a tanker to be delivered. When the tanker truck arrives at the "Rack" to load at a refinery or storage facility is when "gasoline" becomes "regular", "mid-grade", or "premium". This is done by a manifold in the loading system that injects the proper amounts of alcohol and other additives that meet the specification of the branded or unbranded gas station that it will be delivered to. So, different gasoline companies have different specifications for their regular, mid-grade, and premium gasolines. This means that Chevron gasoline IS NOT Club, Arco, etc.

So, what is the difference? Each producer (Chevron, Shell, Exxon Mobil, let's just say the Majors, since they produce most of the gasoline) makes a fuel that meets the specification required here in the U.S., and in many cases the State that it will be sold in. They then add alcohol, which not only puts a lot of money into farmers pockets, but also increases the octane rating of the fuel. Yes, that is right, alcohol is an octane booster! But it is the many other chemicals that are added that really begin to separate the higher quality fuels from the "it makes the gas gauge go all the way over to full" fuels.

These other additives are mostly detergents that help to keep the fuel system from the tank to the intake valve changing the oil in your car or truck. Along with detergents there are even things like silver that are added to keep the electric fuel sending unit in the fuel tank working properly and longer. It is this add pack that makes all branded and unbranded fuel different. It is also why prices vary between brands. So, in a sense you are getting what you pay for.

The more additives in the fuel the more likely it will be more expensive.

So, what is one to do? Well, you could buy a bottle of Brand Whatever fuel additive to put in the tank every 6-10 thousand miles and spend the money that you saved buying the cheapest gas you could find. Or you could save yourself the time and money spent to go get the Brand Whatever and just buy a premium fuel at the gas station. Do the numbers, if you calculate your time, you will probably arrive at the answer that you actually spent more money.

Now, for Mustangs. If you have a high-performance model, whether new or a classic, I would not recommend anything but premium fuel. The higher compression ratios are one reason. But another reason is that to keep these athletes operating at peak performance a clean fuel system is mandatory. I mean, how many to athletes do you know eat garbage, drink heavily, and smoke most of the time and only consume high quality food and drink, and quit smoking when they are about to perform? It doesn't work that way. Some companies even advertise that their fuel can reduce engine wear! Many of us would say "Ah, come on. You expect me to believe that?" Well, it is a fact and has been proven in the lab. Some of you may know that Shell makes this claim about their Shell V-Power Nitro+ Premium Gasoline. This fuel is very popular among the highperformance crowd for street use because of its performance. And because we can't handle paying \$10.50/gallon the same as Shell, or Conoco Phillips, or Costco, or Sam's for 100 octane race fuel to commute to work (well, at least I can't and I don't even have a job). For a more in depth look at this and many oil subjects I recommend going to Lake Speed Jr.'s YouTube channel "The Motor Oil Geek". Lake is a Certified Lubrication Specialist and holds other certifications. He has an oil analysis company "Speed Analysis" and works for Total Seal (those who know, know). He also was responsible for the formulation of Driven Motor Oils while working for Joe Gibbs Racing. He is far more qualified than I and makes really great, informative YouTube vids on the kind of subjects that we (OK, maybe just me) like. Check him out.

Of course, there is way more to this gasoline thing than I have covered here. Next month I will take you on and "Incredible Journey" inside your motor to see things on a clean. Keeping your fuel system clean is as important as micro level and bring you more info on "The Premium Question".

Until then, Pedal to the Metal!

It's that time of year again!

Election time is near and we need to find out who would like to run for office or board position. The board is made up of four elected officers (President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer), the outgoing President, and not less than three, nor more than six members in good standing (current dues paid). Any member in good standing who would like to participate in the management of the club is encouraged to add their name to the ballot. If you are interested in running for office and cannot attend the October meeting, please call President Bob Fentress (see page 2) so that your name can be added to the ballot. Remember, no experience is needed, just willingness to help the club and lots of Mustang spirit! Nominations will be presented at the October General Meeting and nominations will also be taken from the floor at that time. The ballot will be mailed to you in early November and you can either mail it to the P.O. Box or bring it to the November General Meeting.

The following list explains the duties of each office:

- ★ President: Presides over club meetings-board & general (calls meetings to order; announces sequence of business to be discussed; recognizes members entitled to the floor, calls for motions on any questions when necessary, adjourns the meetings, and delegates duties as needed, including the handling of club correspondence), and signs all contracts or other instruments or writing approved by the Board of Directors.

- ★ Secretary: Keeps a record (minutes) of club meetings-board and general; maintains a club roster (unless another officer or board member is assigned to do so); keeps record books of club by-laws and minutes; as well as any amendments thereto, and any other significant reports; prepares and mails election ballots; may prepare an agenda for each meeting if so requested by the president; prepares/responds to club correspondence as directed; and performs other duties as prescribed by the Board of Directors.
- ★ Treasurer: Handles club funds (receipts and deposits); balances the club checking account records with the bank account statement monthly; makes a financial report to the membership each month regarding income and expenditures, collects membership dues and other income; handles the sale of club t-shirts; attempts to collect on dishonored checks received by the club; and makes disbursements as authorized by the board.
- ★ Our club provides an MCA membership to all officers during their term
- ★ Any combination of officers may be required to sign checks for disbursements made from the club account.
- ★ At least two officers hold a key to the club mail box and are responsible for collecting mail.
