




















Mr. Ackermann, The Man You've Never Known

That is unless you have ever been involved in setting up a race or drift car. The terms Ackermann Angle, Ackermann steering geometry or Ackermann's steering trapezium refers to the arrangement of the steering linkage in an auto or carriage that allows the front steering wheels to turn at different angles. This allows the wheels to trace different circles or radii. It was invented by Goerg Lankensperger in Munich in 1816. Later, in 1818, it was patented in London by his agent Rudolph Ackermann. It was a solution to the problem that carriages of the time had with having the two front wheels pivot at the center point of the axle. This created a situation where the carriage would become susceptible to tipping over when sharp turns were attempted. A good way to visualize this is to think of the Radio Flyer wagons that we have all had. There is very little chance that any of us have not crashed one while trying to turn quickly. And if you didn't as a kid, you surely dumped your kids or grandkids while pulling them and attempting to make a sharp turn whether you were going slow or fast.

This is also where last month's discussion of slip angle comes into play. When a 4 wheeled vehicle makes a turn, it is making a turn around a point referred to as the center of the turning circle (see left side diagram). That center point is a line drawn from the centerline of the rear axle and lines drawn perpendicular to each front wheel to the line made by the rear axle. Where those lines intersect is the center point of the turn. Here you will see that the left front wheel in a left-hand turn has a greater angle than the right-hand wheel. This is in order for it to track the radius of the smaller circle that it is travelling compared to the right front wheel. If both wheels turned at the same angle, either the left or right tire, and probably both, would exceed their slip angles due to the lateral force and scrub across the road surface causing heat buildup, excessive tire wear and understeer. Also, notice that the steering linkage, simplified here, forms a trapezoid. This allows the inside wheel to turn more following the smaller radius of the turning circle.



positive Ackermann. If the steering linkage or rack were located in front of the wheel pivot points along the same lines from the rear axle the steering would produce anti-Ackermann as the effect would be reversed and the outside wheel would turn at a greater angle



than the inside wheel in a turn. By moving the rack or steering box closer or farther from the centerline of the front axle, either in front of the axle or behind it, the amount of Ackermann or anti- Ackermann can be increased or reduced. Additionally, changes in camber, caster, and static toe can all effect Ackermann. Keep in mind that this the 30,000foot view of this subject. There is much, much more to this when the application is for cars built for specific types of racing and it is differ-

ent for each type. The engineers that designed the cars that we drive have designed the amount of Ackermann needed to perform at the level the engineers wish to achieve. In almost every case, it is not adjustable without extensive modification. Along with camber, caster, and toe, and Ackermann angle, the tire itself plays a huge role in how our car rides, steers, handles, and stops. Like many things on our cars the engineers design these systems to work with each other to provide the performance or comfort, that they are after. Changing one thing will change other things and can produce better performance, or sometimes produce much worse performance because the system is no longer working within its performance design envelope. Knowing and studying these things can help us to make better choices about modifying our cars. It can also save you good money and headaches from making bad choices when modifying.

To me it is perfectly acceptable to put tennis shoes on a lowrider to achieve the stance and look that one wants for that type of custom. It just would not be wise to try and autocross such a car. Another example would be a 4X4 truck that has a suspension lift of 12" and 3" body lift, 20 X 10" wheels with the lowest and widest profile street tire that can be fitted. It might check all of the boxes for being the coolest looking show truck, but would not be a good choice for driving on icy roads.

So, the next time that you take your car in for a front-end alignment (I suggest that you only go to shops that do 5-wheel alignments. If they don't, find another shop), go out and strike up a conversation with the alignment guy or gal. Once you get them going ask them to check the Ackermann angle. Then, at least, you can have some fun with what you have read here.

Next month I plan on getting back to more earthly things in this screed. Slip angles and Ackermann are fun. And, so is calculating how many rotations a top fuel dragster's crankshaft makes from the starting line to the finish line. I will save you the math, it is only about 539! I just have not determined the worth of knowing these things.
